24hr Relay for Kids tops \$100,000

Revitalized through a new partnership with B.C. Lions Society, the annual 24 hour relay in Kelowna raised an incredible \$102,615 for Okanagan children's programs and camps.

At 10 am Sunday on June 11, tired participants and supporters ended Kelowna's annual Easter Seals 24 Hour Relay for the Kids, cheering the total of pledges that surpassed the previous two relays combined. The funds will be shared evenly between the Okanagan Boys and Girls Clubs and the Easter Seals' Camp programs benefiting disadvantaged children throughout the Okanagan.

The news provided a very happy ending to the challenge that began at 10 am Saturday, June 10th, involving over 400 runners and walkers on 14 teams. Participants ran relay-style around the

2.5 km circumference of the Apple Bowl track and fields continually for 24 hours amid non-stop entertainment and recreation, a food fair and a hospitality patio to watch the hockey games.

Teams vied for top fundraising awards with **Century 21 Assurance Realty Centurions** leading the way with **\$15,019** in pledges. The second highest fundraising team was the Okanagan Boys & Girls Clubs' own Richter Street Rockets with \$3,753.92, and the 3rd place fundraising award, with \$3,377.69 in pledges, was the Okanagan Tree Fruits and Royal Galas Lake Country Community Team.

Those pledges, added with generous sponsorships from Labatt's, MoneyMart, Interior Savings Credit Union, plus the tireless work of the Lion and Lioness Clubs of the Okanagan

selling food and beverage throughout the relay, Okanagan Boys & Girls Clubs and BC Lions Society Easter Seals saw their first year's relay partnership raise \$102,615.

All proceeds will stay in the Okanagan to benefit the Okanagan Boys and Girls Clubs programs and the Lions Society's Easter Seal Camp in Winfield.

Province wide, the Easter Seals 24 Hour Relay in BC has raised \$25,134,624. The Easter Seals' 24 Hour relay for the kids' money provides the funding for the Easter Seals Camping Program, and now in Kelowna to include the Okanagan Boys and Girls Clubs camp programs. Children can enjoy both the Easter Seals and the Okanagan Boys and

Springvalley Elementary Extension program began in September 2005 with great anticipation. Registration was rapid and the program filled to capacity within two months of operation.

The program is very appealing because we are coming to the kids, eliminating the pick-ups and travel time, which makes parents and kids more comfortable in a familiar environment.

The program runs from 2:30 - 4:30pm Monday thru Friday with a cost of only \$2 per day. Kids participate in a variety of daily themes which include sports, games, crafts, computers, cooking and drama.

Parents have responded very positively to the program, and the low cost allows us to include children who would otherwise not be able to afford such a program.

We are currently running with about 20 to 25 children daily with a lot more interest still coming as parents and kids hear about the program from other members.

We are working on our second location for this 'in-school' after school care at Pearson Elementary, which is scheduled to begin early February.

Valuable training funds for school age care professionals

Thanks to the financial support of the Ministry for Children and Family Development, the Okanagan Boys and Girls Clubs have been able to develop and implement a School Age Care Professionals Training Program for caregivers throughout the Valley.

Over 45 participants from Enderby to Okanagan Falls have been participating in training specifically related to their field of work. This 52 hour program helps caregivers further develop their skills and knowledge related to working with children 5 – 12 years of age.

Some of the course content covered over the three months includes: Leadership, Licensing Guidelines, Programming Development, Implementation and Evaluation; Guiding Children's Behaviour and much more.

Tinhorn Creek supports Oliver youth programs

Restorative Justice

This non-court alternative handles RCMP case referrals involving youth who commit minor offences.



Through the guidance of RCMP, trained volunteers, guardians, victims and other interested supporters, the youth participate in a process where they acknowledge responsibility for their behaviour, learn how others are affected and take steps to repair the harm done.

Youth Centre Initiative

The Youth Centre is a place for youth ages 12 - 19 to come to the Centre and visit with friends, take part in activities such as a game of pool, cards, board games, watch a movie or listen to music. It is a place that youth can call their own.

Teen City Beat Mobile Program

Mobile programs reach out to the community by going out to where the youth are, providing recreation opportunities in an environment that is accessible and popular with the youth in this South Okanagan Community.

Through our [Teen City Beat](#) Program we take a van and head out to parks in both the Oliver and Osoyoos.

Fully equipped with sports equipment, table games, food and a propane fire pit - the staff can interact with the youth, forming relationships and addressing their needs.
